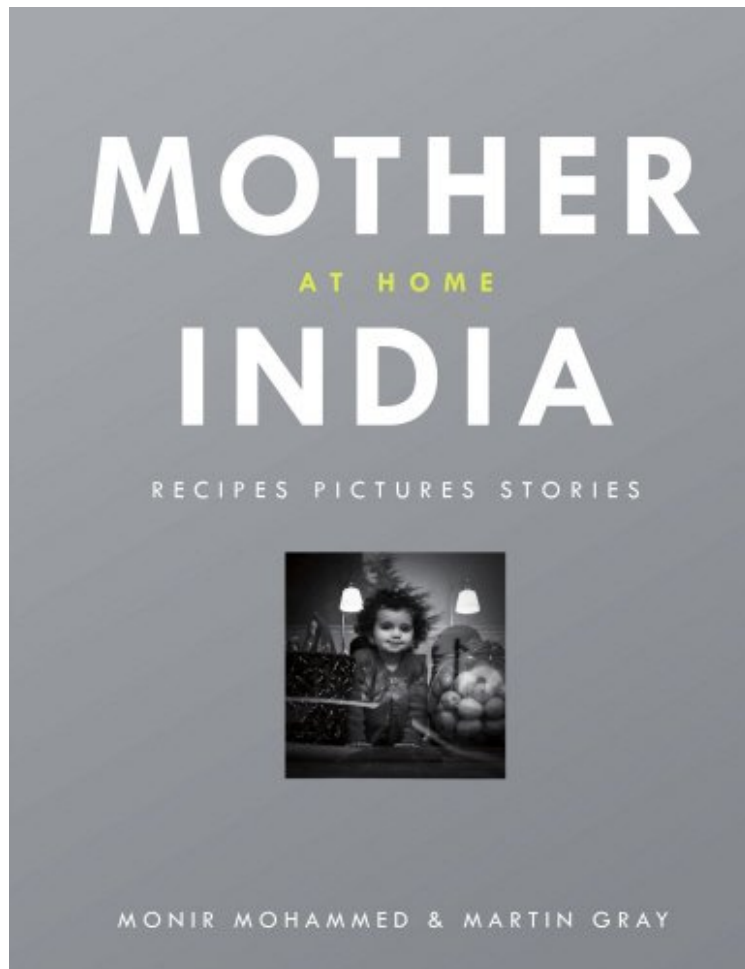

The book also includes an engaging personal summary of the authors path to his successful Mother India empire. The book comprises recipes and a abridged story of the Monir's life, Mr Mother India.Many photographs illustrate the various dishes explained,as well as some thoughtful views of Glasgow, for those unaware, a stunning city in parts. The different aspect of the book is the mix of recipes, they combine aspects of Scottish traditional dishes, with Indian spice, such as the spiced Cullen skink and the chicken pie. The person who gifted the book thought I was joking when I stated these were the recipes I had tried so far! The art of "fusion cooking" is illustrated well, try the Paris Buns, a stalwart recipe from the west of Scotland! All recipes are

straightforward, and probably will need you to check out your spice cupboard! A beautiful presented book, promising adventures in the kitchen. My only rider is the need to be cautious with the number of chillies the recipes suggest using. I found half the number of green chillies satisfied my own and friends spice buds.
